Head Teacher's Message

It has been a pleasure over the last few weeks to show prospective parents/carers of Godwin pupils around and talk to them about our vision and values. Doing this is a really useful way for me to reflect on what makes us unique as a school and why I think they should actively choose us, rather than it just be because we are the school closest to home.

Obviously, as the Head Teacher, you would expect me to be biased(!) but I hope that in this term's newsletters we have shared with you our priorities and some of the fantastic opportunities which we provide for Godwin children so that you can feel just as proud of our school as I am.

Our links with other local schools are really important to us. As part of the Newham North Learning Partnership we collaborate with Sandringham Primary School, Park Primary School, William Davies Primary School, Odessa Infant School, Woodgrange Infant School and Kay Rowe Nursery to ensure the very best outcomes for children in our area.

As you are aware, most of our pupils attend Woodgrange Infant School prior to Godwin, and we work exceptionally well together to ensure a smooth transition for all of our children - in terms of both learning and pastoral support. Looking at how happy and settled Year 3 are, it's clear that this work is successful.

We also have a really positive relationship with Forest Gate Community School, which so many of our Year 6 children transfer to each year. Next week sees the first in a series of sessions which our Year 5 children will enjoy, making use of the specialist facilities and teaching which an outstanding secondary school can offer. We always receive amazing feedback from Forest Gate Community School about how thoughtful, conscientious and polite former Godwin pupils are and how well they reflect on us! This is evident when I see former Godwin students in the local area - they are always keen to chat about what they have been doing recently and it is lovely to see the confident young adults they have become.

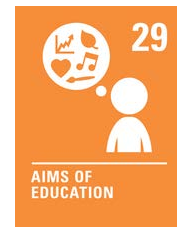

Reading for Pleasure

The benefits of reading for pleasure are now extremely well-documented. For example, children who choose to read make significantly more progress in vocabulary, spelling and maths than children who read very little. However, it also has many non-academic benefits and can increase empathy, improve relationships with others, reduce the symptoms of depression and improve wellbeing throughout life. There are social benefits as well, as it can make people feel more connected to the wider community. It increases a person's understanding of their own identity and gives them an insight into the world view of others. For all of these reasons, we are committed to developing a love of reading within each pupil.

Why Libraries Matter



The Great School Libraries report, published in 2019, showed that only 16% of UK schools have a dedicated single-use library space. This is despite a wealth of research proving that regular access to a quality library impacts positively on reader enjoyment, children's attitudes to learning and reading outcomes and attainment.

Our library is never used for other purposes and we are always looking for the best titles to add to our wide-ranging collection. In addition to thousands of fiction, non-fiction and poetry books, we have a number of magazine and newspaper subscriptions which our pupils enjoy. Each class has a weekly library session where they can find the right book for them and enjoy the calm atmosphere.



An excellent team of Pupil Librarians assists us in making sure this space is organised and welcoming. Their enthusiasm for reading is always appreciated.

Whole-Class Reading

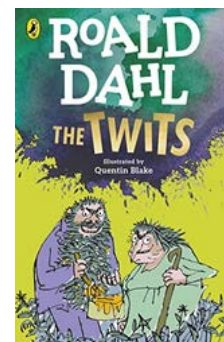
Every class begins the day by reading together. The children have their own copy of the book and are able to follow along as the teacher reads aloud. This enables them to enjoy stories which may be difficult to access independently. It also models successful, fluent reading and develops a familiarity with written sentence structure and punctuation.



The texts are carefully chosen so that children can experience a range of genres and authors. Over the next few pages you can see the selection which each year group will read this year.



Many of these sets have been bought with the proceeds of recent cake sales, so we are extremely grateful for all the help and support we have received. Our sale last Friday raised a massive £403.59 - thank you!

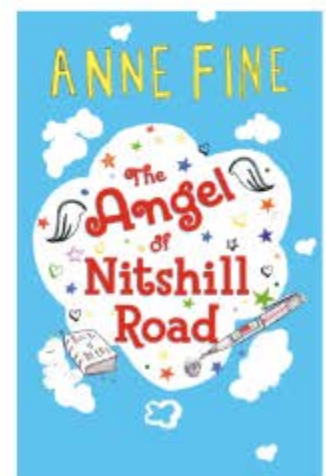
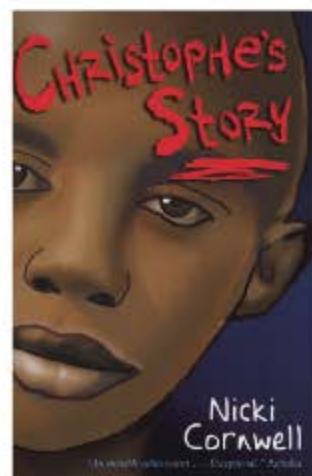
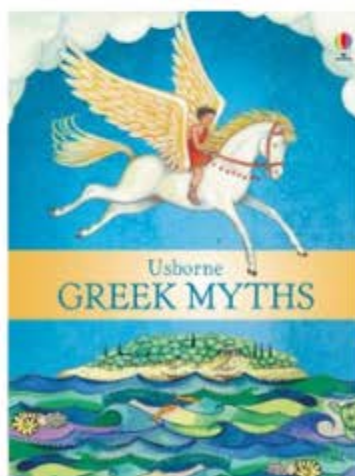
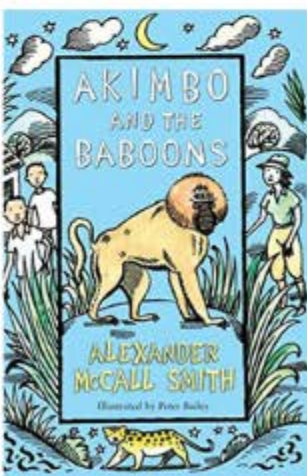
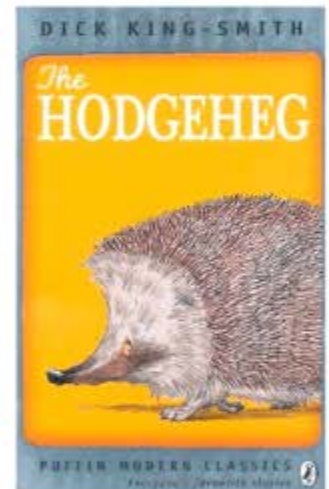
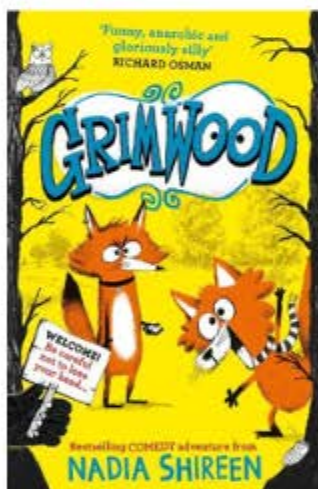
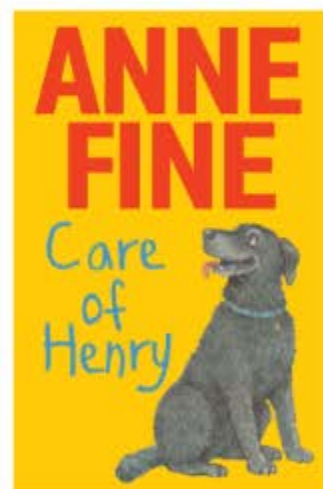
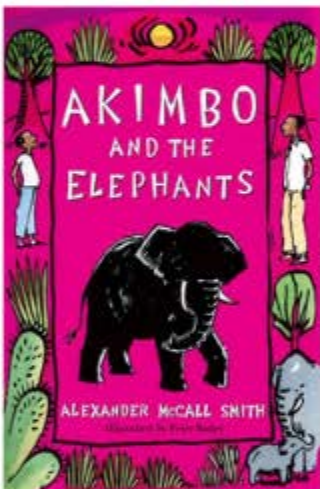
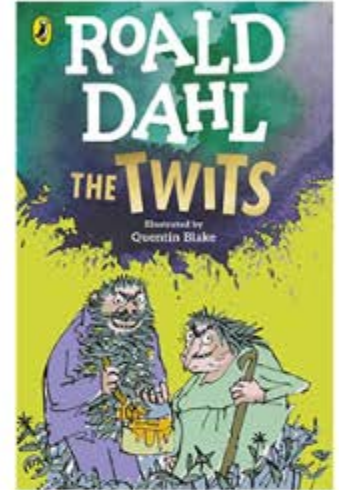
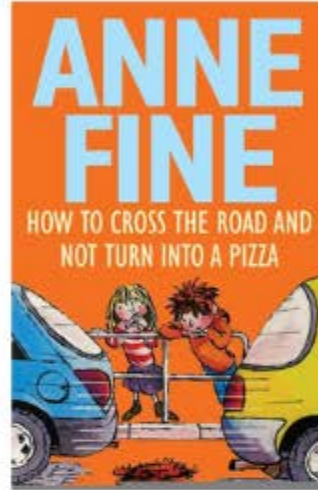
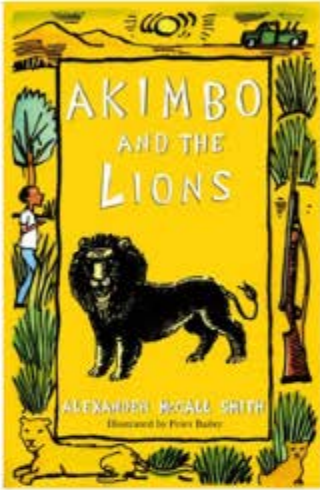

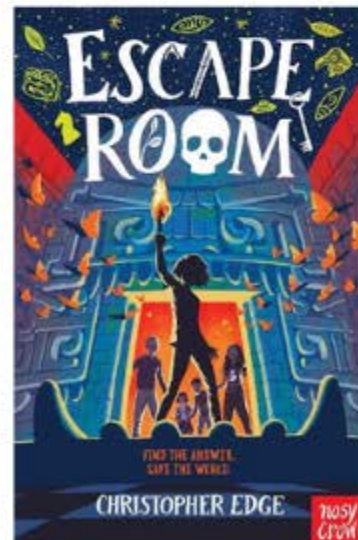
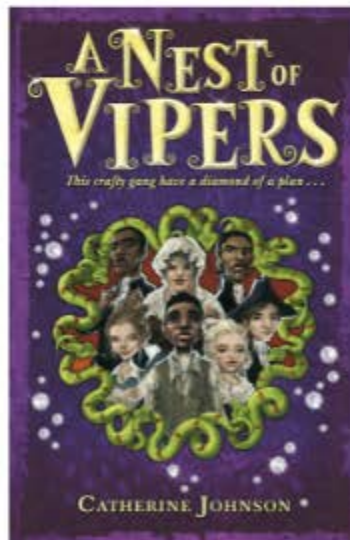
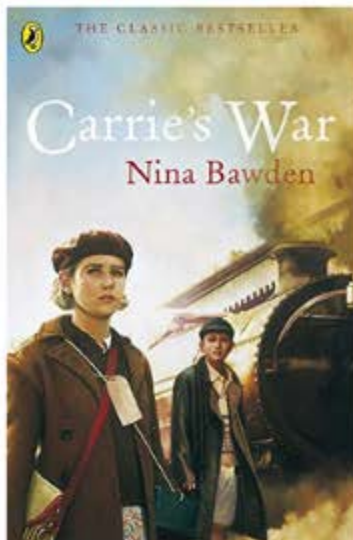
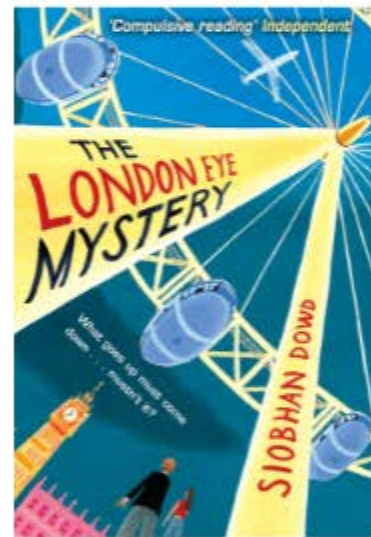
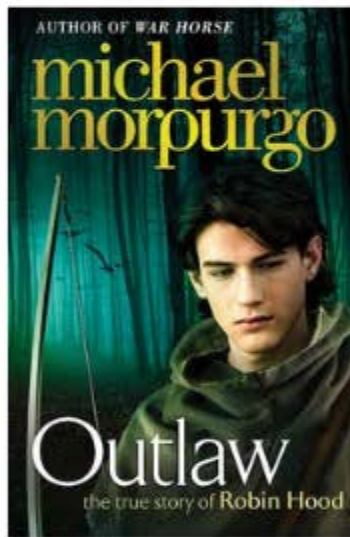
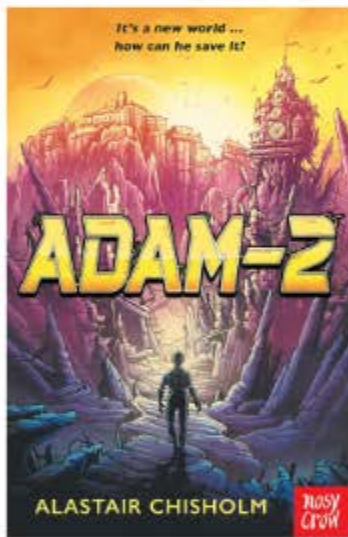
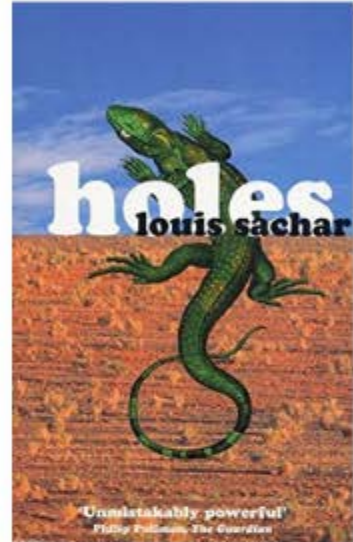
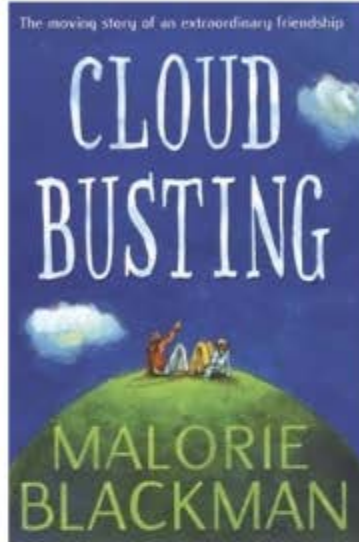
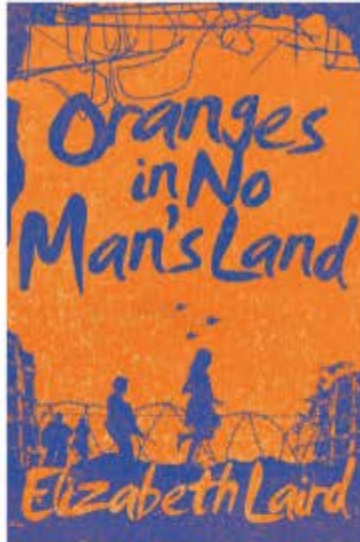
Year 3 Whole Class Reading Books



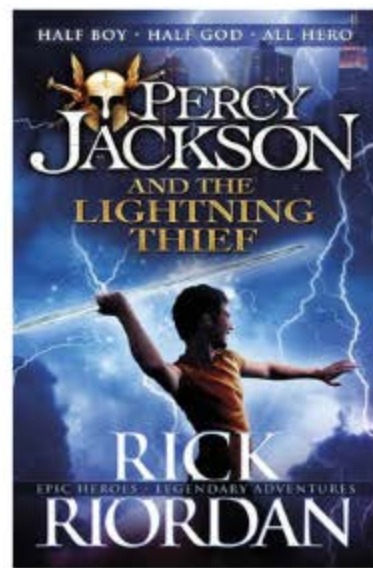
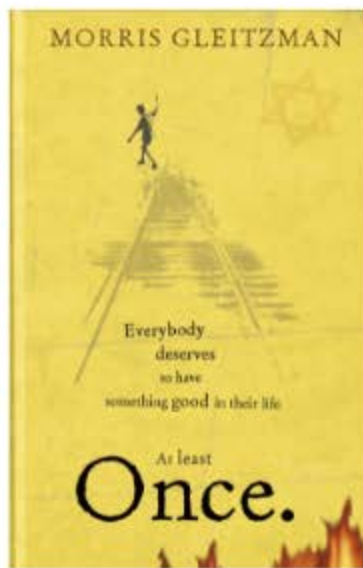
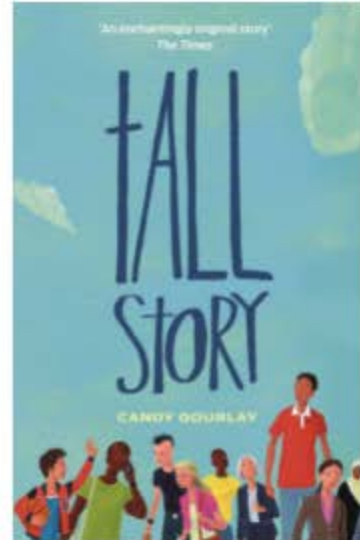
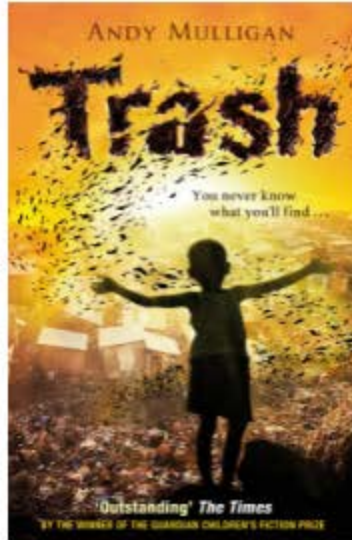
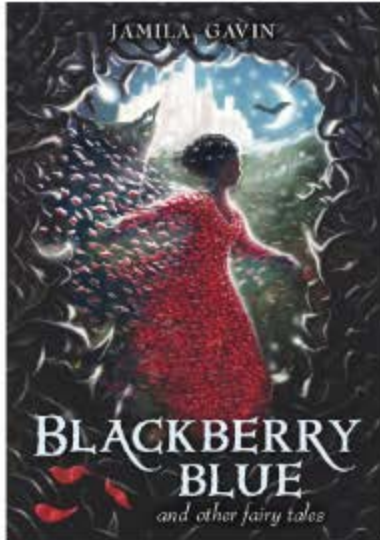
Year 4 Whole Class Reading Books



Year 5 Whole Class Reading Books

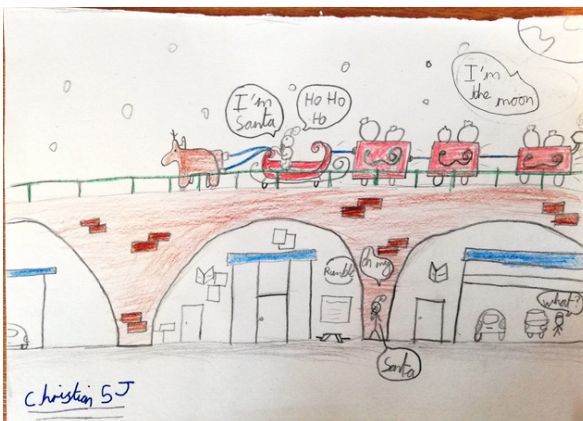

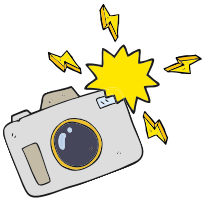

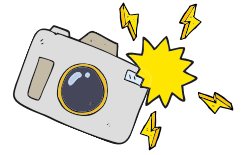

Article of the Week



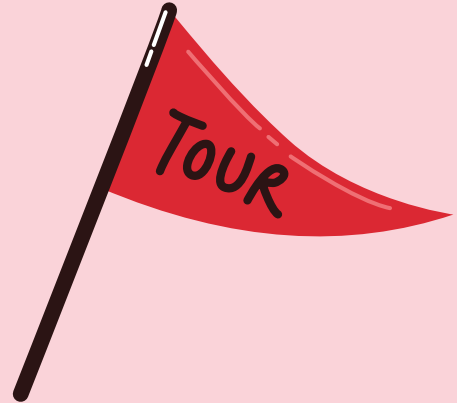
International Day of Disabled People is on 3rd December. This global event celebrates and promotes disability equality. It has been observed since 1981, raising awareness of the issues faced by 1 billion people with disabilities and the role communities and cultures play in removing obstacles to inclusion.

Article 2 specifies that the Convention applies to all children, regardless of ethnicity, gender, religion, language, skills, or other status, what they think or say, or their family background. Article 23 declares that a child with a disability has the right to a full, decent, independent, and active life in the community. Governments must help disabled children and families.

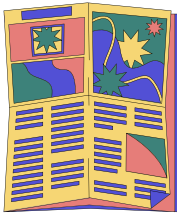
