Black History Month 2022



It's October so that means that people around the UK will be celebrating Black History Month. It's a time for people from all backgrounds to explore and acknowledge the significant achievements of Black people in the past and present. The theme this year is *Time for Change: Actions not Words.*

For Black History Month, you are tasked with researching key individuals who have prompted change throughout history. While these individuals do not need to be British, it would be nice for you to research someone you do not already know a lot about.

Ideas could include: Olaudah Equiano, Mary Seacole, Walter Tull, Claudia Jones, Diane Abbott - the list goes on! Once you have a better understanding of the person you have chosen, it is time to get creative. Come up with a unique way of showcasing the individual you have chosen and explain the change they are responsible for. You could:

- Draw or paint a portrait
 - Write a poem
- Create a fact file or poster

Or, come up with your own idea to display your learning! Entries must be submitted to your teacher and have your name and class on them by 31st of October. Winners will be announced in assembly and the pieces will be displayed in school.

One winner from each year group will receive their own copy of Black and British: an Illustrated History.

Learning Powers

At Godwin Junior School we promote and encourage seven different learning powers:

Being curious, persevering, evaluating, collaborating, embracing mistakes, explaining reasoning and considering choices.

This week, we'll focus on perseverance, which is the ability to push through difficult times or face a challenge without giving up. Why do we need this trait?

- 1. Perseverance helps us grow and achieve our best. Goals are great but people need more than daydreaming to be fulfilled. This is where perseverance comes in. It will help a person reach their goals even though they take time and effort to achieve.
- 2. You gain more self-confidence and strength when you persevere you have come face to face with failure, and survived. Knowing that setbacks didn't stop you makes you feel more positive about the future and your own abilities.
 - 3. Perseverance turns your failures into learning opportunities. The author Bram Stoker said, "We learn from failure, not from success", and this is very true in the classroom. When things go wrong, looking at the mistake can show us ways to be more successful in future. This means children who feel secure enough to take a risk and 'mess up' are often our strongest learners.
 - 4. Your perseverance can inspire others. Everyone has responsibilities and challenges to face but not everyone has the motivation to keep pushing for distant goals. If someone sees that you are working hard and persevering, even in the face of your own issues, they might realise that they can do the same. You might even be thinking of someone right now who you have seen work hard and persevere. Did their actions inspire you to keep going?

Is your child able to make mistakes and keep going anyway? You can help them to build perseverance by noticing and praising their efforts when they work on something tricky, instead of admiring the end result.
