



Head Teacher's Message

This week saw some of our Year 4 children link their science learning on electricity with real-life problems in a Gadget Repair workshop run by Recycle For Your Community. The pupils had a great time working in pairs repairing and testing circuits to fix broken electronic items. Their skills will be put to the test again later this term when they further develop their ability to identify faults and how these can be rectified.

Our Year 6 pupils took part in Newham's Junior Citizenship programme this week. This annual event is run by the Metropolitan Police and saw our children visit the old Tate and Lyle refinery to learn about safety awareness in a number of ways - including contacting the emergency services, gang culture, street crime and online safety. The consensus was that the variety of scenarios made our children think about what to do if they were ever in one of those situations so that they would know how to react.



Forest Gate Community School's music department hosted some of our Year 5 children this week, sharing their expertise in a very engaging session. The feedback from our pupils was very positive and they are looking forward to further visits to enjoy the drama and PE facilities!

Behaviour: The Restorative Approach

Pupils at Godwin are eager to learn and they enjoy school. They are very aware of issues such as fairness and consistency and so a uniform approach to behaviour management is vital. Research has shown that focussing on praising desirable behaviour has a fair greater impact on minimising inappropriate activities than paying disproportionate attention to the unacceptable behaviour itself.

Our school embraces Restorative Approaches (RA) as a means of developing aspirational, motivated and responsible pupils, empowering all staff to be successful and effective practitioners within their classroom as well as raising standards and achievement across the school.



Restorative Practices is a system of formal and informal processes that build and sustain a culture of kindness, respect, responsibility and justice.

Restorative approaches are based on four key features: 'The Four Rs'.

RESPECT: for everyone by listening to other opinions and learning to value them.

RESPONSIBILITY: taking responsibility for one's own actions.

REPAIR: developing the skills to identify solutions that repair harm and ensure unacceptable behaviours are not repeated.

RE-INTEGRATION: working through a structured, supportive process that aims to solve the problem and allows the child to remain in class and be treated fairly.

Staff engage with incidents of conflict using a restorative response. A restorative response to an incident of conflict involves asking the following questions to both the child that has been harmed and the child that has caused the harm.


What happened? What were you thinking? What were you feeling? Who do you feel has been affected by this? What do you think needs to happen now to make things fair and better?

Working in a consistently restorative way in school has a positive benefit for all parties. Those who have caused harm through their behaviour are able to learn how to behave better and are held to account for putting right the harm they have caused. Those who have been harmed are given a voice in deciding what needs to happen next so that they can heal and move on from the situation with their dignity and sense of safety restored.

This February half-term, Newham Libraries is taking part in Mission Zero.

Mission Zero offers young people the chance to have their code run in space! Write a simple program to take a reading from the colour and luminosity sensor on an Astro Pi computer on board the International Space Station, and use it to set the background colour in a personalised image for the astronauts to see as they go about their daily tasks.

Choose one of our sessions to take part in. At each session we'll code and run emulators to submit to the Mission Zero project. Your child's code may run for the astronauts on the International Space Station.
