How TFL Supports Our Pupils



When we think of the essentials for teaching and learning, a person might list items like books, pencils, paper and perhaps technology such as tablets and smartboards.

What many people won't realise is the absolutely essential role that Transport For London plays in supporting education across the capital. Today we'd like to explain and celebrate the impact it has on our pupils.

For many years, TFL has assisted schools in London through its School Party Travel Scheme. As an eligible school, we apply for off-peak travel tickets in advance and receive these completely free of charge for any educational or sporting event.

Without this scheme, we would not be able to offer the enormous range of free and low-cost educational visits which we currently provide. We visit all these places and more using public transport:

This week I accompanied Year 6 to Stratford Circus to watch The Trial of Josie K. Newham Council provided tickets so that every Year 6 pupil in the borough could watch this very funny play.

As we came in from the rain, a staff member opened the doors onto the darkened space. The boy next to me looked at the stage, the rows and rows of tiered seating and then at me. His eyes were enormous. "Woah!" he said, "What is this place?"



Royal Academy of Arts



Now in its fifth year, the **Royal Academy Young Artists' Summer Show** is a free, open submission exhibition for students aged 4–19 studying in the UK. Artworks are judged by a panel of artists and arts professionals, with selected artworks displayed online and on-site at the Royal Academy of Arts.

Submitting artwork is completely free and is done online. We have signed up as a school so when submitting, select Godwin Junior School. Children under 12 will need a family member or teacher to enter for them. Each child can submit one artwork and there is no theme. When entering, you will be asked for an image of your artwork plus some information about the piece such as title, size, and a little text about the artwork and why you made. Artwork will be seen by a panel of judges and the selected pieces will be shown in our online exhibition. Some of the artworks will also be shown at the Royal Academy of Arts.
